Roads

1. Dirt track-The only way to access the resort is by dirt tracks, which are not very good for allowing tourists to access the site but it stops big numbers from entering and does not disrupt habitats.

2. Stone track The only way to access the resort is by the stone tracks. They are stronger and will need less repairing but can chip car windscreens. The road will make access for tourists easier.

5. Motorway This will be an excellent access to the resort with huge tourist numbers that will spend more money. The road construction will be very noisy and disturb animals habitats. Also it will increase flooding. Many trees will have to be cut down.

Appearance

1. Modern state of the art resort-This stadium will be modern and will accommodate up to 500 guests! It will look modern but will stick out like a sore thumb in the rainforest and will cost a lot of money and electricity to run. Many roads will need to be built.

2. Medium sized resort-This resort will house up to 200 guests but will be constructed of brick and cement. A hectare of trees will need to be cut down. It will blend in with the environment but will be large and noisy.

2. A 'eco-friendly' resort- This stadium will use and eco friendly design to reduce its impact on the environment. It will be built from trees which are already fallen down so no trees will need to be cut. They are built on stilts so that they don't disrupt animals on the forest floor. Only few tourists can stay at one time.

Trips and recreation

1. Bronze-

A local guide will take you on a tour of the rainforest. You will try to spot some of the rare species but no photographs are allowed. You will have to travel by boat and foot.

2. Silver-

Go on an Orang-utan tour! Get up close and personal with the Orang-utans and take selfies with them. Although the tour is pricey it is an experience you will never forget. 10% of profit goes to the protection of the species.

3. Gold-

70 seater coach tour which will drive you through the rainforest to see all of the view points on big roads. The final destination is a cable car ride above the rainforest. Flash photography is allowed.

Facilities

1. Bronze-

All energy is renewable. Water from showers is used to flush toilets. All food is locally grown. People go on tours of the rainforest with local villagers. People cycle around the resort. Tourists swim in local river.
