Today we're looking at verbs

What is a verb?

A verb is a doing word.

Why are they important?

Verbs tell you what is happening and the time at which they happen.

We call this the tense of the verb.

Today we're looking at verbs

Verbs can be in the past, present or future tense.

There are different forms of these 3 tenses. Today we'll be looking at two forms of the past tense.

Today we're looking at verbs

If something happened yesterday we say it is in the past tense.

I went to school last week.

This is called the **past simple tense**.

Today we're looking at verbs

If something happened over a period of time but in the past we say it is in the past perfect tense.

I **had been** at school for a while before it was closed.

This is called the **past perfect**.

Past simple

Ivan **went** to bed.

His mum **checked** he was asleep.

He **left** the house.

Past perfect

Ivan **had gone** to bed.

His mum **had checked** he was asleep.

He **had left** the house.

What is the same? What is different?

What is the same? What is different?

That's right.

They're both in the past tense.

In the past perfect sentences they all have “had”.

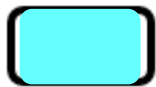
