



















There are special events in Jewish families. What do you think they might be?

Birth/The naming ceremony.




Baby boys are named when they are 8 days old.

Baby girls are usually named on the first Sabbath after they are born but this can vary for different families.



Bar Mitzvah... for boys







and Bat Mitzvah... for girls

When a boy is 13 years old, he will go through a special ceremony called a Bar Mitzvah.



He is then considered an adult.

This happens at 12 years old for girls and it is called a Bat Mitzvah.

Bar and Bat Mitzvahs are special events. Afterwards, the girls and boys are allowed to read from the Torah.

This is a special book for Jewish people.






Special parties are held to celebrate this important event.
